**Project Update** 

My first year as Chairman has been an exciting one

for the Maraetōtara Tree Trust (MTT).

We are making fantastic progress towards our vision of creating a corridor of native planting along the entire 43 kilometres for the Maraetōtara River.

The sustained and ongoing commitment from our major sponsors Unison, David Trubridge and Clearview Winery, along with many other supporting sponsors, meant that we planted 7,700 trees and flaxes along the river during the winter of 2019.

Most of our planting was completed by Habitat Biodiversity and Pest Management Limited. A smaller area was planted by the trustees assisted by staff of our commercial sponsors and pupils and parents from Taikura School.

We are very excited to announce a new sponsorship agreement with Water Testing Hawke's Bay.

This sponsorship will allow us to test the water at a number of sites along the river to assess water quality and the benefits of planting over a number of years.

Planting and growing conditions were favourable during winter, spring and into early summer. However, as many of you will recall, we had a very long hot period during late summer and autumn.

We took the unprecedented decision to spend \$3,000 on watering the newly planted trees which would not have been able to survive the drought. Hopefully, this has significantly improved the trees survival rates and we are confident will prove to be money well spent.

The trust's work was awarded the Hastings District Council's Landmark Award recognising the trust's significant contribution to the promotion of the District's image, identity, sense of place and civic pride.

We had land and plants available to plant 10,000 plants including some infilling for previous losses for season 2020.

Unfortunately, one of the landowners was unable to return to New Zealand to oversee

the planting on his land due to the COVID 19 pandemic. Accordingly, we have had to reallocate some plants which had been ordered for this site

Other landowners and charity organisations assisted us with this, to ensure that we maximise the use of available funding.

We are now looking forward to a great 2021 planting season.

We greatly appreciate the support from the Hawke's Bay community. Remember that every \$5 we can raise means another plant in the ground on the river and a lifelong legacy for the Hawke's Bay Region. All of our trustees are unpaid volunteers. This means we do not have any overheads and can ensure all donations go directly into buying trees and ensuring their survival.

I want to thank my fellow trustees, the outgoing chairman, Pat Turley, who is remaining as a trustee, and our honorary treasurer, Alan Berry who provides all the financial and logistical firepower that makes the trust such a success.

Muri has selected seven functional cultivars (useful to weavers). These are: Tāpoto, Kōhunga, Makaweroa, Raumoa, Hūhiroa, Ngaro and Taeore. These were recently planted.

We handed out flyers and Kawakawa leaves to bring the drivers good health and explained that they could make health giving tea from it at the end of the day. Kawakawa is one of the most important herbs in traditional Maori medicine. It has been used to treat cuts, wounds and various pains, so seemed appropriate for the drivers!

We thank the Targa Rally for this opportunity and trust that we will be able to continue our association in the future.

## Te Awanga **Planting**

On 23rd and 30th July Kepa Toa, Lisl Prendergast and Clare Coyle met Muri Whaanga at The Maraekakaho Road Harakeke (flax collection) to clean and then harvest flax plants for the "Island" at Te Awanga. Muri is the kaitiaki of this collection which was originally the work of Rene Orchiston of Gisborne. There are 61 cultivars and all of them have names. Muri has selected seven for us that are most used by weavers. We have been careful to plant them in their whanau groups: Tāpoto, Kōhunga, Makaweroa, to name but a few.

On Sunday 2nd August we planted flaxes on the island and then on the 9th August with some sterling work from locals we planted 1000 native trees.


There has been great support from local people: Te Awanga, Haumoana and Clive but further afield too. Willie Murphy has helped us with spacing and design. He has also taken drone shots for us. He is the owner operator at Pollen Workshop at 369 Clifton Road.

There will be two more plantings on 16th and 23rd August with elegant grasses like Carex and trees like Kowhai, Koromiko, Five Finger. Ribbonwood, Lemonwood, Lacebark, Kohuhu

We are very grateful to our digger drivers and hard workers of the Regional Council who created huge piles of willow, which were later disposed of making way for the planting in July/ August 2020.

### **Schools and Conservation**

MTT has had great financial support from the Brathwaite Trust as we do educational work with schools. Most recently Kepa Toa and Lisl Prendergast went to speak to Peterhead School and we were to have a visit by the school to the river but COVID19 intervened and the planned trip could not proceed.

Many schools have assisted with planting and it is great to see a huge number of young people assisting planting in August. On 10th September Te Kura o Mangateretere will come and plant on the island. Kepa Toa and Lisl Prendergast are working with the school. Taikura students have been regular planters and the Corrections Department. Good work has been done by them on Adele Mohi's property on Ocean Beach Road. The newly formed Te Wai Mauri Trust from Waiohiki Marae may contribute labour in the future.

## Water Testing Hawke's Bay

A new Partner for MTT



The Maraetōtara Tree Trust's newest corporate partner, Water Testing Hawke's Bay, will begin collecting water samples from the river this month (August 2020). Water samples will be collected

from 10 locations along the Maraetōtara River every month for at least the next 5 years. The water quality monitoring sites have been chosen to highlight any changes in water quality associated with significant inflow volumes from sub-catchment tributary streams. The sites have also been chosen to complement the 2 sample collection locations already monitored by the Hawke's Bay Regional Council as part of their State of the Environment (SOE) reporting.

The collection and analysis of water samples from the Maraetōtara River has been a long-term vision for many members of the Maraetōtara River restoration project team. With the recent partnering of the Maraetotara Tree Trust with Water Testing Hawke's Bay, this vision has now been realised and in the future will form an integral part of the Maraetōtara River restoration project story. It is hoped of course that positive changes (or differences between sites) in water quality become evident over time, and that some of these improvements may be attributable to the extensive fencing and restoration work undertaken by the Maraetōtara Tree Trust.

## Our Journey

Report from our Treasurer and **Project Planner** Alan Berry.

When seven local citizens set off in 2002



with their vision of clearing the Maraetōtara River and planting its entire 43 kilometres in native trees and shrubs, little did they realise the enormity of the undertaking that lay ahead of them. But here we are in 2020 with 150,000 native trees planted along the river's banks and "only" another 100,000 in front of us to complete the project - perhaps another ten years' work for our team of trustees and our dedicated community and commercial supporters.

The nature of the project has however evolved as time has passed and rather than just planting trees for the sake of trees we have become increasingly involved in protecting and enhancing the bio-diversity

within the river itself. The waterway is home to a multitude of different life forms and we are so pleased that our trees have also helped to preserve the habitat of the river-life by reducing livestock intrusion and nutrient runoff into their river. Lisl Prendergast has in this issue told us about the trust's work at the mouth of the river at Te Awanga. One of the bio-diversity objectives of the Te Awanga plantings has been to protect the prolific inanga (whitebait) spawning areas along the banks of the Maraetōtara just before it enters the sea.

But all of this comes at a cost. Over the past five seasons the trust has planted 60,000 native trees along the riverbank but we have paid out more than \$250,000 for the purchase of plants and for contract work on site preparation, planting and aftercare that the trustees and their supporters could not manage on their own. We have been able to achieve this only with the assistance of governmental agencies, our commercial sponsors, community trusts and our many supporters in the community. They share our vision and the Maraetotara Tree Trust is making that vision happen.

There is still a great deal of work to do along the length of the river but the journey is so rewarding.
